Roadside Boat Checks...

Following is copy of an article that appeared in the Minneapolis Star Tribune, (January 8, 2012) :

Boaters and anglers will face mandatory roadside check stations this spring, where their crafts will be inspected for aquatic invasive species--part of a statewide crackdown. Boats that fail inspections will be sent to a decontamination area to be high-pressurewashed with hot water. Violators can expect citations and fines instead of warnings (for the full story, see startribune.com/outdoors).

"It's long overdue," said Barb Halbakken Fischburg with the Minnesota Coalition of Lake Associations. Yes, she said some boaters won't like being diverted to inspection stations. "But the risk factor if we don't do this is much greater," she said. "If we don't protect fishing, we don't have a tourism industry."

Meanwhile, boaters will be required to apply free decals provided by the DNR to their boats reminding them to comply with the law, including draining all water from boats and bait containers and removing vegetation or invasive species from boats and trailers. Those stickers should be available later this month.

There have also been warnings for those buying used docks or lifts. They need to be thoroughly checked and cleaned of zebra mussels. Docks being moved from one lake to another can easily be a carrier for invasive species, which then infest a new lake.

And a good time was had by all!

Water Quality Facts

Improving and maintaining water quality is a major concern of your Lake Association. Water quality is determined on three measures:

Clarity - this is measured by lowering a white (secchi) disk about the size of a dinner plate into the water at selected locations. The number of feet the disk is lowered until it disappears determines clarity. Jim Peterson has been doing this test for many years. John Sedey does it too, in conjunction with gathering water samples for the following two additional measures. Between May and September 2011 a number of readings varied from a high to 17 feet (May) to a low of 5 (August). The average monthly readings for this year were 10.2 feet. Our five-year average has been 9.1.

Phosphorus—this is a measure of the amount of nutrients in our water. Monthly water samples are sent to a lab in Detroit Lakes for analysis. Average readings for summer 2011 were 20 units. Our 5-year average is 24.4 units. (Lower number is better) **Chlorophyll**—this is a measure of algae in our water. Monthly samples during summer 2011 averaged 7.6 units, with a fiveyear average of 9.4. Again lower numbers are desired.

In addition to our frequent periodic secchi readings and monthly water samplings, the Association commissioned Wenck Associates to conduct thorough samplings (spring and fall), for weeds around the entire lake. Although we await the scientific analysis data, preliminary indications by the samplers are mixed (good news/bad news). While no Eurasian Milfoil was found, large amounts of other vegetation, such as Curlyleaf Pondweed, were discovered. The study findings and recommendations will be presented at our spring general membership meeting. By John Sedey
